We moved to the beautiful community of Magnolia Point Golf & Country Club over eleven

years ago. Norma and I are native to the area and, upon the recommendation by a daughter, we purchased our home sight unseen. Having enjoyed the Magnolia Point lifestyle and many wonderful neighbors, we would make the same decision again.

Having served on committees and the Board of Directors I have become familiar with both the good and the not so good. It seems that when one is looking for ways to improve our community, he or she can become focused on the blemishes. We gain perspective, however, when we return from one of our many trips or vacations and enjoy the beauty, we see upon entering our front gate. Though we are blessed by centuries-old trees, the added touches from our landscape committee cannot go unnoticed. A hearty thanks to you.

As we drive our streets, we rarely see an unkempt yard, improperly parked car in the street, abundance of boats, RVs or other minor annoyances that distinguish Magnolia Point from communities who place no value on a reasonable sense of order. The appearance of our community seems to leave little doubt that most of our friendly neighbors have read our covenants and governing documents. Most, it seems, live in Magnolia Point "because of the covenants while very few live here despite our covenants".

As a member of the Board, I receive many emails. Most are related to rules enforcement. Board members are prohibited from direct participation in enforcement, but I do make note and forward your concerns. Lately, all Board members have been flooded by your concerns on what amounts to a very few who are knowingly violating long-established protocol/covenants regarding extended parking of Boats, RVs, trailers, and the like.

In addition to the above, the most recent concern is the presence of PODS. How are they addressed in our governing documents and "what is reasonable"? If you are reading this, it is likely that an ad hoc committee of approximately ten neighbors has met

to consider the facts and make reasonable recommendations to the Board. Please stay tuned.

PS...This is what our covenants have to say about vehicles etc....

"No vehicles or boats (including, but not limited to boat trailers, travel trailers, camp trailers and motor homes) or any similar property shall be kept on any part of the Platted Property except such areas as may be specifically reserved and designated for such use, or stored on any Lot except within a garage or an enclosed screened area and except that private passenger automobiles of the occupant of a Dwelling Unit and guests, having no commercial signs, may be temporarily parked in the drive way or parking area of the Dwelling Unit and except that other vehicles may be parked in such driveway or parking area during the time necessary for delivery and pickup service and solely for the purpose of such service. Nor repairing or overhauling of any vehicle is allowed on any part of a Dwelling Unit, a Lot, or any Roadway." (3.12)

Volunteers have constructed about 85 wood mailboxes while making approximately 200 sets of free vinyl numbers. Although the volunteers will provide advice and some help for wood structures, they have discontinued the manufacturing. Volunteers will gladly, refinish your metal numbers and furnish free reflectors for any mailbox.

More New Homes

When we moved to Magnolia Point in 2010, I believe there was not a single new home under construction. Times were tough, and prices were low. Our home was five years old at the time and sold for \$61,000 under its selling price when new. My, how things have changed. We have, since, added and built out 119 new lots in phase VIII along with seeing homes built on 50 or more existing lots that were developed previously.

The latest news is that Dream Finders has cleared six lots on Oglebay Drive and will begin construction soon. I am not sure of the exact number, but I believe there are only about 20 lots available of the 966 lots that are part of the Magnolia Point Planned Unit Development (PUD).

There are many other subjects that could be addressed in this column. Topics of interest certainly include Tower Park, modification of the front entry lanes, back entry, roads, and drainage etc. Please open your blast emails regularly. The Board makes every attempt to communicate items of immediate concern.





Citizen's Advisory **Committee**

The City of Green Cove Springs has a vision as it plans to transform itself into a 21st century city that reflects its traditional values, natural features and historic characteristics while defining its unique identity and assuring a quality of life for its residents. One of its main goals in its Vision Process is to involve the property owners. To accomplish this, the city solicited applicants city-wide this past January and ultimately selected 30 advisors who make up the Citizen Advisory Committee (CAC). Their role is to manage the anticipated concerns of the city's residents regarding the future development of the city.

The purpose of the advisory committee is to provide an opportunity to assure transparency as a practice and priority, create citizen involvement, develop informed ambassadors for the city, create a pool of future leaders for the City Board and Councils, capitalize on the skill sets and expertise of citizens, and provide an opportunity to share and participate in the successful future of the city. The CAC is a tool for residents to use to channel their questions and concerns; it is not a policy influencing committee.

The role of individual advisors is to listen to residents they may encounter who have questions or concerns about the upcoming changes. Although not a problem-solving body, the committee's advisors bring residents' comments to their meeting for further presentation to the City Council. To date the CAC has had very informative presentations by the City Attorney, Chief of Police and the head of Planning with many more city officials to come to future meetings.

FLORIDA FRIENDLY

Florida has 663 native plants, of which are 326 best suited to grow in Clay County. A number of these rooted in Cindy and Steve Triay's yard have earned their Medinah Lane home the distinction 'Florida-Friendly

Landscape'.

So what is it? Florida-Friendly is a landscape that provides a combination of 'ingredients' from these categories: wildlife food and water sources, cover, places for wildlife to raise young, and

sustainable practices in keeping the whole thing, well, humming.

As much satisfaction is derived from appreciating the sights and smells of native fauna in its wild state, 'Friendly Landscapers' get quiet thrills watching a somewhat greater variety of native animals make their homes alongside their own, or at least check in as regular visitors. While there's wildlife everywhere in Magnolia Point, it's the numbers and variety that's different in the Friendly yard.

The Florida Native Plant Society (FNPS), maintains a county 'lookup' table of plants at: https://www.fnps.org/plants. You can even refine your results by plants most attractive to butterflies, hummingbirds, and/or other wildlife for our area.

Starting ten years ago, Cindy applied FNPS

principles to a gradual re-make of their property. A little bit at a time was the key.

"Start small. Don't try to do this overnight," she says. "I had some help here and there, but did most of it myself. I did have a lot of help with these pavers, though" as I follow Cindy along a trim hardscape path to her backyard.

Pavers? Is this allowed? The vista that unfolds in the backyard challenges my preconceived notions of what these 'Friendly' landscapes are all about.

Florida Friendly Myths Debunked

Yes, you can have fun in a Florida *Native Yard.* The Triay backyard is hardly the jungle you might expect. First up is a 'Better Homes' tailored open patio. Pavers are allowed, as are fire pits and umbrellas. And yes, you can have a screened-in pool and still be Florida-Friendly.

It's not a mess. Nor unkempt or unruly: there's great discipline in maintaining these yards, quelling the urge to nip and tuck. Leave that Twinberry just as it is; those sprays of new growth are just what songbirds are looking for when they need a break. Likewise with planting. It takes selfcontrol to resist the urge to crowd bulbs and cuttings to re-create a magazine-cover wall of color; but a more natural spacing allows critters to find the refuge they prefer.

Overall, the property is open, inviting, familiar: there are plenty of grassy areas, exclusively St. Augustine, and though tailored and lush, admittedly shrinking by


an average of one foot each year as Cindy progresses to a more natural overall look.

It's not chaos. It's training the mind's eye to see the flora and fauna around us more as nature intended, and the rewards can be both subtle and surprising at the same time. I saw butterflies at Cindy's I know I've never seen before and a few uncommon plant specimens in rare startling proportions.

Nothing is forever. You can take things out of the Friendly yard once they're in; there's no hard rule about leaving things completely untouched. You learn that some thinning may be necessary to balance plant health, sustainability and wildlife refuge.

It's not the 'whole nine yards.' While most think of an entire property as a 'Florida-Friendly Landscape' is the most familiar designation, you can also have a smaller area of your whole yard certified Florida-Friendly.

Others can call your Friendly Yard home. You don't have to give up your favorite plants. Included in Cindy's yard are some species that are common in other, similar climates. A stunning Staghorn Fern, for example. Overall, Cindy's yard has more than **50 species of natives**. In total, FNPS certification requires that no more than Continues on Page 12

25% be non-native.

Asked what she likes the most about her vard: "The tranquility," Cindy smiles.

Throughout the property are nooks and crannies carved into the plantscape, each with a bench, where she might retreat during the day to rest and take it in. "Not to mention the savings, which can be pretty significant." Bills for nearly all landscape maintenance and certainly chemicals and fertilizers, she explains, are a thing of the past.

Rounding the corner of her lanai, one is taken by a banana palm towering over one corner of the yard.

"Banana peels," her fingertips flit outwards, "that's all I've ever fed it!"

Her Blue Banana is the pride of her efforts. "From a bucket to this," she stuns her visitor, "in one year!" Halfway up the three-trunked, Jack's Beanstalk-big palm hangs a bulging bunch of its first fruit, "And they taste like ice-cream. We can't

wait!"

How much time does this labor of love take?

"That depends on the season," Cindy says, "Just like any other yard here." Overall, she's calculated, the work required is no more than any traditional property at Magnolia Point.

Forty-five years ago, she contacted area Club Pros and eventually got the cooperation of dozens of clubs to give up three tee times each Tuesday for a ten-week season. Thank you, Emily. And thanks to **Adrienne Whitman** and **Debra McDermott** who now competently and cheerfully coordinate and schedule Summer Team Play.

Here is how it works. This year we have 23 courses competing. They are divided into

four "areas." The format is partner match play. We have six players per side so there are three foursomes paired by handicap. If we win a hole, we get one point, a tie is a half point and a loss is zero points. The points are cumulative over the season so the team in each area with the highest point total is the winner in their area. They then go on to the playoffs and after three rounds of competition a champion is crowned.

This season our opponents in our area are St. Johns Golf and Country Club, Atlantic Beach Country Club, The Golf Club at South Hampton, and The Plantation at Ponte Vedra. The final fun competition is a team made up of a Pro and three ladies from each club. This year Palencia will host on August 23.

Students, Butterflies, and Collaboration

Returning to school last August, students at the Charles E. Bennett Elementary School were treated to the sight of beautiful plants and flowers in large white ceramic pots in front of their school as the result of a collaboration between the Magnolia Point Women's Club and the Garden Club of Green Cove Springs. The plants continue to be watered and maintained by a garden club member.

A further joint effort between the two clubs had to be put on hold for the 2020-21 school year due to COVID restrictions. The plan was to plant a butterfly garden for the students' enjoyment and education. Hopefully, the school restrictions because of the pandemic will be lifted so this project can be completed this school year.

Earlier this year, President of the Garden Club Connie Gladding made a presentation to the City of Green Cove Springs suggesting the city become an official **Monarch City USA**. Green Cove Springs has been a Tree City USA for the past 32 years and since Mayor Van Royal signed the Proclamation on March 2, Green Cove Springs is now a **Monarch City USA**, one of only two cities, along





with Gainesville, in North Florida to have the designation.

The goal of **Monarch City USA**, a nonprofit organization based in Maple Valley, Washington, is to encourage municipalities to support the **monarch** butterfly population. Officials will also encourage residents to plant native milkweed and nectar plants, which are vital to the **monarch** species.

The Garden Club has planted milkweed, a food source for the monarch larvae, in the gardens they maintain at the Green Cove Springs Public Library. Milkweed, preferably the native variety, is the first thing planted in the garden as a host plant for the larvae, and the garden also needs flowering plants to provide nectar, which provides food for the butterfly. As the butterfly goes from plant to plant for nectar, it's also pollinating the plants. The Garden Club plans to continue its important work to increase the number of butterfly habitats.

Garden Club meets September-June, on the third Thursday of the month at 10am at St. Mary's Episcopal Parish Hall, 400 St. Johns Ave., Green Cove Springs. Visitors are always welcomed.

Then, many men have asked for details about our new Men's Golf Association




