As we enjoy the beautiful spring weather and watch this neighborhood bloom again let us all be thankful that we are seeing the light at the end of the tunnel regarding the Covid-19 pandemic.

Many of us have received our vaccine inoculations and are feeling a bit more relaxed as we try to resume social interactions with neighbors and friends. But please, do not think it is all past us. There are still many, many people becoming infected locally and throughout the nation and world. Please stay vigilant, use masks in crowds and avoid unnecessary exposure as we go forward. The experts say it will not be too much longer before we reach more normal conditions and we can get there if we protect each other.

Your board is moving forward with researching solutions for the occasional traffic back-ups at the main gate. Many residents have made inputs of possible solutions and we are looking at each proposal for practicality and applying a cost-benefit analysis. I must admit that I was surprised with responses that ranged from "it's not a problem, don't spend any money on it" to "hire more guards at least during peak entry times" to "widen the entrance and make the back gate available again to tradesman." An interesting point brought up by our previous Access Control Chair is that a major factor in the backups is resident's failure to use the TEK Control Visitor Management System which forces the guard to call the homeowner for clearance for the visitor and results in several minute delays for entry. The system is easy to use and can reduce the visitor delays entering the neighborhood.

At the last board meeting we approved formation of a strategic planning group made up of interested residents to develop ideas and plans for our neighborhood to evolve as our demographics change and Clay County is growing around us. The group is just forming, still looking for members and will solicit ideas from our neighbors which will be vetted and ranked for things we can do to improve Magnolia Point. If you are interested in joining this exciting effort, please contact any board member and we will put you in contact with the current members. The group will also advertise for members on our community social media.


I ask each of you to consider what effect your actions have on your neighbors. Recently we had a report of a resident taking all their grass clippings after mowing and dumping them on the edge of the golf course. The golf course does not need extra work and dumping clippings is certainly not the right thing to do. It is easy to get rid of yard waste by simply bagging the clippings and leaving them near the street on Tuesdays to be picked up and disposed of by the city.

Jon Bastress suggested that I include some of the issues which have been brought to the board lately, and I agree that these may be of interest to our members:

 Pets not on a leash and aggressive animals. Residents are reminded that our rules say that pets are not allowed to run free. Dogs must be kept on a leash when outside a confined area and owners are responsible to clean up after their pets

- when the pets defecate. If you observe violations try to remedy the situation by bringing it to the owner's attention. If you cannot resolve the issue with the pet owner, call Clay County Animal Control (904-284-6342).
- **Fishing in the ponds.** Most of the neighborhood ponds are private property and in most cases individuals must cross other's property to access them. Those wishing to fish should ask property owners for permission to cross their property and fish. If violators refuse to comply, call Green Cove Springs Police (904-529-2220).
- Speeding on neighborhood streets or tailgating through the back gate. Do not confront the individual but if possible, take a picture of their license plate and call the Green Cove Springs Police (904-529-2220).

The CAM and REC will be stepping up enforcement of yard care as the weather improves and plants and weeds begin to thrive again. Please make sure you stay after your yard work so that it does not become overwhelming or beyond your abilities. It is important to maintain high standards of appearance and maintenance of our properties.

Rules Enforcement Committee Reminders

It is that time of year to remind residents to reacquaint themselves with the rules of our MP Community Handbook. Some folks have either

forgotten or are unaware of the most common reasons for violation letters.

Many of our new residents may be unaware we have an online copy available. You can find it on our website (www.magpt.com). In the left-hand column, click on "Governing Documents" and then, click on "Community Handbook." The handbook is a simplified version of our covenants and rules. The handbook will be updated shortly with all new revisions.

Some of the most common violations include:

- Garbage cans must be stored where they are unable to be seen from the street.
- Yards with excessive weeds, bare spots, dead or overgrown shrubs, grass growth over the curb etc. must be attended to.
- Basketball goals (portable) must be stored near the garage when not in active use.
- Mold and mildew on houses, garages and roofs need to be removed.
- Window AC units are prohibited.
- Residents who use the back gate are reminded that if they bring their boats, RV, or trailers into the community, they MUST go to the front gate and get a 48-

hour pass and display it where visible from the street.*

 Mailboxes must be maintained, painted, reflectors added and numbered.

By abiding by these and other rules, we can avoid most violations and inconvenience to homeowners. If you are in doubt about something, go to the www.MagPt.com website and read the handbook that has a complete list of all rules. By cooperating and following the rules, we all benefit and can enjoy our beautiful community.

*Note: Any RV boat or trailer without a pass displayed is automatically considered unauthorized and subject to a violation.
