Association News

It is time to consider the use of your money again. And it is time to determine the amount of the 2022

assessments. Each year, near the end of summer, we assemble information and estimate appropriate and required spending for the upcoming year. Upon assembly of the Budget, it is submitted to the Board of Directors for approval. This will most likely happen at the November 8th board meeting. You can view the 2021 Budget and current year-to-date comparative revenues and expenses, as well as accumulated funds on the financial sections of the Magnolia Point web site, <u>www.magpt.com</u>.

If you have not registered on our website or have not given our association your current email address and permission to communicate with you via email, we urge you to contact our Community Association Manager (CAM), Mary Marchiano, at 904-940-1002, extension 323, and please do so. Receiving association emails will keep you better informed and help to prevent unnecessary mail spending.

Some major factors that I perceive might increase Operating Fund spending, and may necessitate increased quarterly assessments for 2022, are the mandatory minimum wage requirements that could result in increased service costs to us in our Administrative Services accounts, the Gate Controlled Access Security Contract, pond maintenance, and utilities.

Then, I would expect possible contract cost increases in the areas of Management Fees from our community association management company, meeting room costs, landscaping costs from our community landscaping and irrigation company, any increase in the Club Use Fee under the Magnolia Point Golf & Country Club Agreement, which provides for the use of facilities at the Club excluding the golf course, which might be recommended by the Club Liaison Committee, and of course, general inflationary costs of various goods and services.

Then, the Board and CAM must look at the Reserve Fund cash, which is primarily accumulated to provide that cash be available to fund longer term community spending for infrastructure such as roads, stormwater drainage, and waterways (retention ponds), trees, common areas, etc. It seems that some action is likely to increase this reserve by funds transferred from Operating Funds or assessments increase.

Primarily our CAM, President, and Treasurer may contact Board members, Standing Committees, vendors and suppliers in the attempt to best project 2022 costs. In the event that you feel motivated to provide your input to spending and assessments, now would be the time to contact these people with your suggestions.

At this time, I would like to note that in the past couple of years, since the resident Board Members have taken control of our Association's revenues and expenses, spending has been reduced in many areas such as accounting, management fees, common area maintenance costs, and gate guard security costs. This has enabled us not to have regular assessment increases since the beginning of 2018. Now, the opportunities for reduced spending are very limited. One that has been discussed is the Tower Park area on Route 17 by Harbor Road, but thus far, there seems not to be a community consensus regarding the maintenance, beautification or disposition of this Association asset.

Primary accounts and amounts to focus

on in the 2022 Budget and 2021 actual include:

- Assessments Revenue primarily billed as \$345.14 for four (4) quarters (January, April, July, and October) for 966 homesites.
- Replacement Fund Transfers \$21,000 transferred monthly from the Operating Fund to the Reserve Fund.
- Management Fees \$8,114 monthly to the HOA management company under the annual agreement with annual increases.
- Club Use Fees including Red Nine Monthly use fees, per home site, under the contract with Magnolia Point Golf and Country Club; currently \$37 per site per month.
- Security Contract Current contract with guard service based on required hours; currently averaging about \$15,600 per month.
- Landscape Contract primarily cutting trimming, edging, etc. for the community's common areas under contract for \$5,852 monthly.
- The above 5 transfer and cost categories account for about 78 percent of the monthly assessments.

We encourage you to review the financial activity in our community by accessing the "Financial information on our Association's web site. And I thank those of you who are able to attend monthly Board Meetings in our Clubhouse Dining Room as graciously provided to us by the Rothfels, our resident Club owners.

GOLF TIP Last month I shared a tip from Manuel de la Tore. As I related, he emphasized swinging the golf club with control and balance.

So this month, let me add two more of his instructional pointers:

- 1. For Manuel, all good golf swings begin with a grip where the two hands face each other as they wrap around the handle of the golf club. As you wrap your hands around the club, be sure to grip without choking the life out of it. Remember, the golf club is your friend, not your enemy.
- 2. All good golf swings incorporate a balance between a relaxed and athletic stance, with slightly flexed knees and arms that hang without tension. From this setup, golfers can generate a smooth swing with a consistent tempo.

Hopefully, these tips help you the next time you tee it up.

Tennis Court Report

Want to achieve a more healthy and active lifestyle?

A study by Oxford University, and researchers in Finland and Australia, followed more than 80,000 adults aged 30 and over in England and Scotland for an average of nine years to find out if certain sports protected them against early death. It found that people who played racquet sports regularly were the least likely to die over the study period, reducing their individual risk by 47% compared with people who did no exercise. Yet running appeared to have no impact at all on dying early, and neither did playing soccer or rugby. When the team looked just at the risk of death from cardiovascular disease, they found that swimming reduced the risk by 41%, racquet sports by 56% and aerobics by 36%.

After the first play date, a "scorecard" for each player is created and her score by hole from that day is recorded, depending on which course was played. Throughout the season, the golfer's "card" is compared with her day's score. Anytime a golfer has scored better

Golf Carts at Magnolia and in GCS

Prior to our July association meeting, Chief Derek Asdot and members of his force made a presentation to our residents about crime and safety in Green Cove Springs and specifically, Magnolia Point. The complete report can be found on our homepage at <u>www.magpt.com</u>.

The golf cart policy that the City adopted was part of the discussion. The city has designated that you may operate a golf cart on all streets located within its jurisdiction with a speed limit of 35 mph or less. This does not include HWY US 17 (Orange Ave) nor SR 16 (Ferris/Idlewild). Crossing a golf cart on either of these roads is technically illegal.

To obtain permission from the State of Florida to cross these roads, a comprehensive traffic engineering study needs to occur. This study is planned to occur this Fall/Winter and will determine the steps the city needs to take to complete the process of making Green Cove Springs a golf cart friendly city.

Other points made by the police about golf carts include:

• Governors Creek Bridge was a major stumbling block for the approval process from FDOT. That has been fixed and is now golf cart compliant.

• Carts that cannot exceed 20 mph must be equipped with brakes, safe tires, red reflecting warning devices (can be tape) on all four corners of the cart and a rearview mirror.

• Carts that exceed 21 mph are defined as low-speed vehicles (LSV's). These carts need to be registered, have headlights, brake/taillights, windshield, additional mirrors, seatbelts, as well as the equipment noted above.

• Operators of Golf Carts: The City of Green Cove Springs has enacted an ordinance that is more restrictive than that the of State of Florida's legal requirements. Ordinance 86-149: All operators of golf carts hereunder must possess a valid learner's or operators driver's license and comply with all laws and restrictions pertaining thereto.

Parents, if the police stop your unlicensed golf cart driver, they will be coming to see you and they will not be ticketing the unlicensed driver. But, a parent can be warned or ticketed.

Magnolia Point families, make sure all of your cart drivers are aware of the following rules:

• Drivers of golf carts within our community must have a valid State of Florida driver's license or a learner's permit and be accompanied by an adult licensed driver.

• Golf carts must adhere to the same driving and parking laws as automobiles.

• Driving or parking on grassy areas is prohibited.

Golf carts may only be driven between



dawn and dusk unless they are equipped with headlights and brake lights that are in operating condition.

• All passengers must be properly seated while the cart is in motion.

• The number of occupants shall not exceed the seating capacity of the cart.

All golf carts driven within the community must be registered in one of two ways:

1.Carts driven on the golf course must be registered with the country club.

2. Carts not used on the golf course must be registered with our community association.

All registration forms are available in the Golf Pro Shop in the clubhouse. Upon completion of the form, including your insurance company and policy number, return it to the Pro Shop and they will process it. If your cart is used on the course, the Pro Shop will install a numbered sticker on each side of your cart.

If your cart is registered with the community association, you will be contacted to plans to install the stickers.

Unregistered golf carts may be subject to fines.
